The Sermon

THE SMALL CATECHISM: THE SECOND ARTICLE OF THE APOSTLES' CREED AND ITS MEANING What is the Second Article of the Apostles' Creed?

And in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried. He descended into hell. The third day He rose again from the dead. He ascended into heaven and sits at the right hand of God the Father Almighty. From thence He will come to judge the living and the dead.

What does this mean?

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the virgin Mary, is my Lord, who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true. Let my prayers be set forth before Thee as incense, and the lifting up of my hands as the evening sacrifice.

My soul doth magnify the Lord and my spirit hath rejoiced in God my Savior. For He hath regarded the low estate of His handmaiden: For, behold, from henceforth all generations shall call me blessed. For He that is mighty hath done to me great things and holy is His name. And His mercy is on them that fear Him from generation to generation. He hath showed strength with His arm.

He hath scattered the proud in the imagination of their hearts. He hath put down the mighty from their seats and exalted them of low degree. He hath filled the hungry with good things and the rich He hath sent empty away. He hath holpen His servant Israel in remembrance of His mercy

as He spake to our fathers, to Abraham, and to his seed forever. Glory be to the Father and to the Son and to the Holy Ghost; as it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

Services in Light of COVID-19

The midweek services scheduled for March 18 and 25 and April 1 will be recorded and posted to <u>www.oursaviorlcms.com</u>.

The proclamation of the Word will continue, so that we may live as Christians in these turbulent times and conduct ourselves in ways that confess Christ and glorify our Father.

Lenten Theme: The Second Table of God's Law

The theme for our Lenten Vespers services is the second table of God's law, the Fourth through Tenth Commandments (*study them at catechism.cph.org*). As God's law reflects your sin, He drives you to repentance and faith in your Lord Jesus Christ, who both kept the entire law on your behalf and suffered the punishment you justly deserve.

On Ash Wednesday, we heard how the Lord Jesus restores you to your Father in heaven by obeying His Father's will (Exodus 20:12; Deuteronomy 6:1–2, 4–15, <u>sermon</u>).

Like the patriarch Joseph, our Lord Jesus was brought low and then raised up to preserve life (March 4: Exodus 20:13; Genesis 45:3–15, *no sermon manuscript or audio available*).

The marriage of Adam and Eve is a picture of the Lord as our faithful bridegroom who gave Himself for His bride, the Church (March 11: Exodus 20:14; Genesis 2:15–24, <u>sermon</u>).

Salvation came to Zacchaeus the tax collector through the Lord's generosity (March 18: Exodus 20:15; Luke 19:1–10, <u>sermon</u>; <u>service</u>).

On March 25, nine months before Christmas, we celebrate the Annunciation of Our Lord, when Jesus was conceived by the Holy Spirit of the virgin Mary (Isaiah 7:10–14; Hebrews 10:4–10; Luke 1:26–38).

According to the flesh, Jesus was descended from David, whose honor and reputation were defended by Jonathan, even as He would later be denounced by false witnesses (April 1: Exodus 20:16; 1 Samuel 19:1–7).

On Maundy Thursday (April 9), we see how our Lord took the form of a servant, turned His heart toward us, and gave His true body and blood for our contentment (Exodus 12:1–14, 20:17; 1 Corinthians 11:23–32; John 13:1–17, 31b–35).

Finally, on Good Friday (April 10), the darkness and wrath threatened against the people of Israel at Mount Sinai falls upon Jesus in His crucifixion as He bears the full weight of our punishment (Exodus 20:18–21 and passion account).

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
