The Resurrection of Our Lord from the Four Gospels

Easter Sunday Dawn: Matthew 28:1–8; Mark 16:1–8; Luke 24:1–12; John 20:1–16

Very early on Sunday morning, just at dawn, Mary Magdalene and the other women went to the grave, with spices to embalm Jesus' corpse. On the way they were asking each other, "Who will roll away the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?" The stone was very large. But suddenly there was a powerful earthquake! An angel of the Lord came down from heaven, rolled the stone away, and sat down on it. His face was like lightning and his clothes, white as snow. The guards were so terrified they shook and fell like dead men.

The women arrived at the grave just as the sun was rising, and they looked and saw that the stone was rolled away. Mary Magdalene ran to tell Peter and John. The other women went into the tomb, but they did not find the body. As they stood there confused, suddenly two men in shining white clothes were standing beside them, saying, "Why are you looking among the dead for Someone who is alive? He's not here. He has risen. Remember how He told you, He must be crucified and on the third day rise again?" They were terrified. Then a young man, sitting to the right in long, white robes, told them, "Don't be afraid. I know that you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth who was crucified. He has risen. He is not here. Come, look at the place where He lay. Now, quickly, go tell His disciples that He is going on to Galilee. They will see Him there." The women hurried out of the tomb and ran from the grave, filled with fear and joy.

When Mary came to Peter and John she told them, "They've taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they've put Him!" They left for the grave, and John outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down and saw the linen cloths, but he did not go in. Behind him came Peter, who went straight into the tomb and saw the linen cloths lying there, and the cloth which had been around Jesus' head, not with the others, but folded up by itself. Then John went in, too, and saw and believed it. (They still did not understand the Scripture—that He had to rise from death.)

The disciples went back, but Mary stood crying outside the grave. Sobbing, she bent down and looked in and saw two angels in white, sitting where Jesus' body had been, one at the head and one at the feet, who asked her, "Woman, why are you weeping?"

"They've taken away my Lord and I don't know where they've put Him!" she answered. Then she turned and saw Jesus standing there, but she didn't realize who it was. He asked her, "Woman, why are you crying? Who is it you're looking for?" She took Him for the gardener and said, "Please, sir, if you've taken Him away, tell me where you've put Him, and I'll go and get Him!"

"Mary!"

"Master!"

An angel asked, "What are these tears?

He is alive! He is not here!

How can you weep with Joy so near?"

Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah!

Easter Sunday Morning: Matthew 28:9–10; Luke 24:10–13; John 20:17–18

Jesus told Mary Magdalene, “Stop clinging to Me—I haven’t ascended to My Father yet. But go to My brothers and tell them, ‘I will ascend to My Father and your Father, to My God and your God.’” She went and announced to the disciples, **“I have seen the Lord”**—and what He had told her.

The other women, who had fled from the tomb, said nothing to anyone on the way because they were afraid, when suddenly, Jesus met them and said, “Rejoice!” They came to Him and grasped His feet and worshiped Him. And Jesus told them, “Don’t be afraid; go, take word to My brothers to leave for Galilee. They’ll see Me there.” So they went and reported all this to the Eleven and all the others.

But, though Mary Magdalene and Joanna and Mary, James’ mother, and the women with them told them all these things, their words seemed to the Apostles to be nonsense and they would not believe them. And two disciples left that very day for Emmaus, a village about seven miles from Jerusalem.

**Though two disciples, doubting, fled,
He found and fetched them, breaking bread,
Firing their hearts with all He said:
Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah!**

Easter Sunday Afternoon: Luke 24:14–35

The two of them were talking with each other about everything that had happened, when Jesus Himself approached and started walking with them. But their eyes were kept from recognizing Him. He asked them, “What’s this you’re discussing as you walk?” They stopped, downcast, and one of them, named Cleopas, answered Him, **“Are you the only visitor in Jerusalem who doesn’t know the things that have happened there these past few days?”**

“What things?”

“The things about Jesus of Nazareth! He was a prophet, with powerful words and signs in the sight of God and all the people. And the chief priests and the rulers of our people delivered Him up to be condemned to death, and crucified Him. But we had hoped that He was the one who would redeem Israel. Besides that, it’s three days now since it happened, and some of our women have astonished us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, and when they didn’t find His body, they came back telling us they’d seen a vision of angels who said He was alive. Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it as the women said, but they didn’t see Him.”

“How foolish you are! How slow your hearts are to believe everything the prophets have said! Wasn’t it necessary for the Messiah, the Christ, to suffer these things and then enter into His glory?” And starting with Moses and all the prophets, He explained to them everything about Himself in all the Scriptures.

When they reached Emmaus, He acted as though He were going farther, but they urged Him strongly, saying, **“Stay with us; it’s getting toward evening. The day’s almost over.”**

When He was at the table with them, He took the bread and blessed it and broke it and gave it to them. And their eyes were opened, and they recognized Him—and He vanished from their sight! And they said to each other, **“Weren’t our hearts burning inside us, while He walked with us on the road and explained the Scriptures to us?”**

They got up immediately and returned to Jerusalem, where they found the others gathered together at the table and saying, **“The Lord has risen indeed! He’s appeared to Simon!”** Then the two started to tell what had happened on the road, and how Jesus had revealed Himself to them in the breaking of the bread.

**That night th’apostles met in fear;
Among them came their master dear
And said, “My peace be with you here.”
Hallelujah! Hallelujah! Hallelujah!**

The Easter Gospel in the Evening: Mark 16:14–16; Luke 24:36–48; John 20:20–23

While they were still talking, though the doors were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus Himself came and stood in the midst of them and said, “Peace be with you!” They were startled and frightened and thought they were seeing a spirit! So Jesus said, “Why are you upset? Why do doubts arise in your minds? See My hands and feet—it’s I Myself! Touch Me, and see—a spirit doesn’t have flesh and bones. But as you see, I do.” And He rebuked them for their lack of faith and their stubborn refusal to believe those who had seen Him. And when they still couldn’t believe it because of joy and amazement, He asked them, “Do you have anything here to eat?” They gave Him a piece of broiled fish, and He ate it in front of them, and said, “This is just what I told you while I was still with you: Everything about Me in the Law of Moses, the Prophets, and the Psalms must be fulfilled.” And the disciples were glad when they saw the Lord!

Then He opened their minds to understand the Scriptures and told them, “This is what is written: That the Messiah should suffer and rise from death on the third day, and repentance and forgiveness of sins will be proclaimed in His name to all the nations, starting at Jerusalem. And you are witnesses to it.” Then once more He told them, “Peace be with you. As the Father sent Me, I am sending you!” And with that, He breathed on them and said, “Receive the Holy Spirit. Whoever’s sins you forgive are forgiven! Whoever’s sins you retain are retained. Go into the whole world and proclaim the Good News: Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved!”

Having heard the Word, what do you believe?

I believe in one God, the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth and of all things visible and invisible.

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only-begotten Son of God, begotten of His Father before all worlds, God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God, begotten not made, being of one substance with the Father, by whom all things were made; who for us men and for our salvation came down from heaven and was incarnate by the Holy Ghost of the Virgin Mary and was made man; and was crucified also for us under Pontius Pilate. He suffered and was buried, and the third day He rose again according to the Scriptures, and ascended into heaven, and sitteth on the right hand of the Father, and He shall come again with glory to judge both the quick and the dead, whose kingdom shall have no end.

And I believe in the Holy Ghost, the Lord and giver of life, who proceedeth from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son together is worshiped and glorified, who spake by the prophets. And I believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. I acknowledge one baptism for the remission of sins, and I look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life \dagger of the world to come. Amen.

He defends them against the devil and the power of sin. The same Christ will openly come again to judge the living and the dead.
