

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On the Athanasian Creed

Early in the fourth century, a new teaching appeared which claimed that Jesus was not true God. Arius, the north African priest who first taught this, was extremely persuasive, and soon the controversy was so widespread that a church council was called to settle the matter. Out of that meeting in AD 325 came the Nicene Creed, which clearly confesses Jesus to be true God. That creed, which was expanded in AD 381 to defend the divinity of the Holy Spirit, is still widely used today as a confession of the triune faith. Despite the clarity of the Nicene Creed, the controversy continued for some time. Toward the end of the fifth century, another creed was written that marveled at the mystery of the Trinity in a way that no creed had ever done. Though attributed to Athanasius, a fourth-century opponent of Arius, this anonymous creed came at a later stage in the debate. The Athanasian Creed proclaims that its teachings concerning the Holy Trinity and our Lord's incarnation are the catholic faith. In other words, this is what the true church of all times and all places has confessed. More than fifteen centuries later, the church continues to confess this truth, confident that the triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, has given himself for our salvation.

THE ATHANASIAN CREED: THE CHURCH'S CONFESSION OF THE HOLY TRINITY

Whoever desires to be saved must, above all, hold the catholic faith. Whoever does not keep it whole and undefiled will without doubt perish eternally. And the catholic faith is this, that we worship one God in Trinity and Trinity in Unity, neither confusing the persons nor dividing the substance.

For the Father is one person, the Son is another, and the Holy Spirit is another.

But the Godhead of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit is one: the glory equal, the majesty coeternal.

Such as the Father is, such is the Son, and such is the Holy Spirit:

The Father uncreated, the Son uncreated, the Holy Spirit uncreated;

The Father infinite, the Son infinite, the Holy Spirit infinite;

The Father eternal, the Son eternal, the Holy Spirit eternal.

And yet there are not three Eternals, but one Eternal,

Just as there are not three Uncreated or three Infinites, but one Uncreated and one Infinite.

In the same way, the Father is almighty, the Son almighty, the Holy Spirit almighty;

And yet there are not three Almighties, but one Almighty.

So the Father is God, the Son is God, the Holy Spirit is God;

And yet there are not three Gods, but one God.

So the Father is Lord, the Son is Lord, the Holy Spirit is Lord;

And yet there are not three Lords, but one Lord.

Just as we are compelled by the Christian truth to acknowledge each distinct person as God and Lord, So also are we prohibited by the catholic religion to say that there are three Gods or Lords. The Father is not made nor created nor begotten by anyone.

The Son is neither made nor created, but begotten of the Father alone.

The Holy Spirit is of the Father and of the Son, neither made nor created nor begotten, but proceeding. Thus, there is one Father, not three Fathers; one Son, not three Sons;

one Holy Spirit, not three Holy Spirits.

And in this Trinity none is before or after another; none is greater or less than another;

But the whole three persons are coeternal with each other and coequal,

so that in all things, as has been stated above,

the Trinity in Unity and Unity in Trinity is to be worshiped.

Therefore, whoever desires to be saved must think thus about the Trinity. But it is also necessary for everlasting salvation that one faithfully believe the incarnation of our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, it is the right faith that we believe and confess that our Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, is at the same time both God and man.

He is God, begotten from the substance of the Father before all ages;

And He is man, born from the substance of His mother in this age:

Perfect God and perfect man, composed of a rational soul and human flesh;

Equal to the Father with respect to His divinity,

less than the Father with respect to His humanity.

Although He is God and man, He is not two, but one Christ: one, however, not by the conversion of the divinity into flesh, but by the assumption of the humanity into God;

One altogether, not by confusion of substance, but by unity of person.

For as the rational soul and flesh is one man, so God and man is one Christ,

Who suffered for our salvation, descended into hell, rose again the third day from the dead,

Ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father, God Almighty,

from whence He will come to judge the living and the dead.

At His coming all people will rise again with their bodies and give an account concerning their own deeds.

And those who have done good will enter into eternal life, and those who have done evil into eternal fire. This is the catholic faith; whoever does not believe it faithfully and firmly cannot be saved.

Note on Holy Trinity Sunday

as we move from the festival half of the Church Year into the Time of the Church

The second half of the Church year starts today on Trinity Sunday. Unlike the first half of the Church year with its changing seasons and colors and the joyous celebrations of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost, we now enter a long stretch sometimes described as "ordinary time." It's not that these Sundays are dull or boring—how could they be when Christ comes with all His gifts! It's just that during this time the Church settles into her regular rhythm and patterns.

So we call this "the Church's half-year." It's all about what Jesus *does* right now in the world to everybody who receive Him. It's all about how He opens God to us and opens us to God and takes us in, that is, from the time He baptizes each of us and, through the Holy Spirit, gives us faith to receive all the forgiveness and eternal life He won and accomplished for us once and for all. It's all about receiving His grace now and growing in grace now and spreading His grace now and sharing in the life of Jesus now. We spend an entire half year studying and celebrating what Jesus Christ *does* in us, and we do it every year because we'll never get done with how much He still *does* as our crucified, risen, and ascended Lord.

This time has been called "the Green Meadow" because green is the color on the altar, pulpit, lectern, and for Pastor's stole. It's the color of life and growth both in the natural world and for the Church as the Holy Spirit nourishes us through the Word of Christ and His Holy Sacraments. Still, between now and Advent, there are gentle and gradual changes in theme as we move from spring, through summer, to fall. The first Sundays after Trinity emphasize the work of the Holy Spirit in the life of the Church. Then we will name our Sundays by their connection to some key festival dates:

June 29	St. Peter & St. Paul, Apostles
August 10	St. Lawrence, Martyr
September 29	St. Michael & All Angels
November 1	All Saints' Day

These Sundays address the growth and fruits of Christian faith and love nurtured by the apostolic ministry of the Gospel (Apostles' Tide) and manifested in the bearing of the cross, even unto death (Martyrs' Tide). Following the Feast of St. Michael, the focus turns to the spiritual warfare of the Church against the devil, the world, and all the powers of darkness (Angels' Tide). The final Sundays of the Church Year focus on the hope and promise of the resurrection in view of the glorious coming of Christ for the final judgment (the Last Sundays of the Church year).

Then it's back to Advent again. And so it goes, Church year after Church year, round and round. You might think we were just going in circles, but the truth is that we'll go round and round and round and round and *then* . . . we'll fly off suddenly into splendor when Jesus comes again. He'll end this whole creation and the whole new creation will start. Christians who've died will come from heaven with Him and rise from their graves alive and well, and we who are still alive will be caught up together with them to meet the Lord, to pass through the judgment safe with Him and then to enter, body and soul, what no one has ever seen or heard or imagined. Everything He *did* for us, once for all, and everything He *does* in us now—it's all for this. It's all for the moment when we see with our own eyes Christ the King—already reigning—and start the life we were made for.

The Sacrament of the Altar

As the head of the family should teach it to his household.

Who receives this sacrament worthily? Fasting and bodily preparation are certainly fine outward training. But that person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins." But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words "for you" require all hearts to believe.

From the Large Catechism: There is also need for some admonition and encouragement. Then people may not let such a great treasure—daily administered and distributed among Christians—pass by unnoticed. So those who want to be Christians may prepare to receive this praiseworthy Sacrament often. For we see that people seem weary and lazy about receiving the Sacrament. . . . Those who are true Christians and value the Sacrament as precious and holy will drive and move themselves to go to it.
