This shall be so, for I believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

I believe that God has made me and all creatures; that He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them.

He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life.

He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this, it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him. This is most certainly true.

And I believe in Jesus Christ, His only Son, our Lord.

I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord,

who has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death,

that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom, and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity. This is most certainly true.

I believe in the Holy Spirit.

I believe that I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith.

In the same way, He calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies the whole Christian Church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith.

In this Christian Church, He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers.

On the Last Day, He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ. This is most certainly true.

Let us pray:

Our Father who art in heaven:

With these words, You tenderly invite us to believe that You are our true Father and that we are Your true children, so that with all boldness and confidence we may ask You as dear children ask their dear father.

Hallowed be Thy name.

Your name is holy in itself, but we pray that it may be kept holy among us also. Let Your Word be taught in its truth and purity, and let us, as Your children, lead holy lives according to it. Help us to do this, dear Father in heaven. But anyone who teaches or lives contrary to Your Word profanes Your name among us. Protect us from this, heavenly Father!

Thy kingdom come.

Your kingdom comes by its own power without our prayer, but let it come to us also. Give us Your Holy Spirit, so that by Your grace we believe Your Holy Word and lead godly lives, here in time and hereafter in eternity.

Thy will be done on earth, as it is in heaven.

You do Your good and gracious will even without our prayer, but, Father, do Your will among us also: Break and hinder every plan and purpose of the devil, the world, and our sinful nature, which do not want us to hallow Your name or let Your kingdom come. Strengthen and keep us firm in Your Word and faith until we die, because this is Your good and gracious will.

Give us this day our daily bread.

You certainly give daily bread to everyone without our prayers, even to all evil people. Lead us to realize this and to receive with thanksgiving our daily bread, including everything that has to do with the support and needs of the body, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, home, land, animals, money, possessions, believing husbands and wives, believing children, believing workers, believing and faithful superiors, good government, good weather, peace, health, self-control, good reputation, good friends, faithful neighbors, and other things like these.

And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us.

Father in heaven, we pray that You would not look at our sins or deny our prayer because of them. We are neither worthy of the things for which we pray, nor have we deserved them, but we ask that You would give them all to us by grace, for we daily sin much and surely deserve nothing but punishment. And help us to sincerely forgive and gladly do good to those who sin against us.

And lead us not into temptation.

You tempt no one, but we pray that You would guard and protect us so that the devil, the world, and our own sinful nature will not deceive us or mislead us into false belief, despair, or other great shame and vice. Although we are attacked by these things, grant that we may finally overcome them and win the victory.

But deliver us from evil.

Father in heaven, rescue us from every evil of body and soul, possessions and reputation, and finally, when our last hour comes, give us a blessed death and take us from this valley of sorrow to Yourself in heaven.

For Thine is the kingdom and the power and the glory forever and ever.

We are certain that what we have asked pleases You, Father, and that You have heard us, because You Yourself have commanded us to pray in this way and have promised to hear us.

Amen, amen. Yes, yes, it shall be so!

The Sacrament of Holy Baptism

from the Small Catechism

Baptism is not just plain water, but it is the water included in God's command and combined with God's Word.

Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Matthew: "Therefore, go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

Matthew 28:19

Baptism works forgiveness of sins, rescues from death and the devil, and gives eternal salvation to all who believe this, as the words and promises of God declare.

Christ our Lord says in the last chapter of Mark: “Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned.”

Mark 16:16

Certainly not just water, but the word of God in and with the water does these things, along with the faith which trusts this word of God in the water. For without God’s word, the water is plain water and no baptism. But with the word of God it is a baptism, that is, a life-giving water, rich in grace, and a washing of the new birth in the Holy Spirit.

St. Paul says in Titus chapter three: “He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit, whom He poured out on us generously through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, having been justified by His grace, we might become heirs having the hope of eternal life. This is a trustworthy saying.”

The Sermon

Scripture from the Small Catechism, Galatians 3:23–4:7, and Luke 8:26–39

Confession and the Office of the Keys

from the Small Catechism

Confession has two parts: first, that we confess our sins,

and, second, that we receive absolution, that is, forgiveness from the pastor as from God Himself, not doubting but firmly believing that by it our sins are forgiven before God in heaven.

The Office of the Keys is that special authority which Christ has given to His Church on earth to forgive the sins of repentant sinners, but to withhold forgiveness from the unrepentant, as long as they do not repent.

This is what St. John the Evangelist writes in chapter twenty: The Lord Jesus breathed on His disciples and said, “Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive anyone his sins, they are forgiven. If you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven.”

John 20:22–23

From these words, I believe that when the called ministers of Christ deal with us by His divine command—in particular when they exclude openly unrepentant sinners from the Christian congregation and absolve those who repent of their sins and want to do better—this is just as valid and certain, even in heaven, as if Christ our dear Lord dealt with us Himself.

You have seen me, O God, and my ways were not hidden from You.

All I have done was plain in Your sight.

*When I rested in sin and not in Your word,
When I left it to others to work for the spread of Your word,
When I judged the way others served You,
When I worked for You as though it were a burden,*

Forgive me.

*When I held back time, using it not as Your gift but selfishly,
When I held back money, spending it not as Your gift but as my possession,
When I held back Your Gospel to myself, and neglected the lost ones You love,*

Forgive me.

*When I did not learn Your word,
When I held back my trust from Your word and believed this world instead,*

Forgive me.

For Jesus' sake, because He has done what I should have done and has paid what I should have paid, and because He is praying for me now, open my mind to Your word and fill me with Your Spirit and Your love. And so that I can offer myself to You without shame, serve You gladly, and be consecrated to Your holy word with everything I am and have,

I ask for grace. I want to do better.

The Sacrament of the Altar

from the Small Catechism

Our Lord Jesus Christ, on the night when He was betrayed, took bread, and when He had given thanks, He broke it and gave it to the disciples and said: "Take, eat; this is My body, which is given for you. This do in remembrance of Me."

In the same way also He took the cup after supper, and when He had given thanks, He gave it to them, saying, "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins. This do, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of Me."

Mt 26:26–28; Mk 14:22–24; Lk 22:19–20; 1 Cor 11:23–25

This is the true body and blood of our Lord Jesus Christ under the bread and wine, instituted by Christ Himself for us Christians to eat and drink.

These words, "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," show us that in the Sacrament forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation are given us through these words. For where there is forgiveness of sins, there is also life and salvation. Whoever believes these words has exactly what they say: "forgiveness of sins."

The Sacrament of the Altar

As the head of the family should teach it to his household.

What should admonish and encourage a Christian to receive the Sacrament frequently? First, both the command and promise of Christ the Lord. Second, his own pressing need, because of which the command, encouragement, and promise are given.

From the Large Catechism: If you could see how many knives, darts, and arrows are every moment aimed at you [by the devil], you would be glad to come to the Sacrament as often as possible. But there is no reason why we walk about so securely and carelessly, except that we neither think nor believe that we are in the [sinful] flesh and in this wicked world or the devil's kingdom. Therefore, try this and practice it well. Be sure to examine yourself, or look about you a little, and just keep to the Scriptures. . . . With God's grace, you may feel your misery more and become hungrier for the Sacrament.
